

PROF. MICHAEL HANCHARD

Ever thought about the threads that tie together the underpinnings of slavery and democracy?

In his recent publication, "The Spectre of Race: How Discrimination Haunts Western Democracies," Professor Michael Hanchard cracks the ideas behind the egalitarian characteristics of democracy that are often complicated by ethno-national groups, races, or religions that have proclaimed a right to rule, taking a classical approach to analyzing slavery. Professor Hanchard has dedicated his career to studying and conducting research in the area of comparative politics with an interest in themes encompassing nationalism, racism, xenophobia, and citizenship within contemporary political theory. His field work has led him to many corners of the world including Brazil, the United Kingdom, Cuba, Colombia, Ghana, Italy, and Jamaica. Additionally, Professor Hanchard has channeled his passion for political dynamics by serving as the Director of the Marginalized Populations Project at the University of Pennsylvania Center for Africana Studies. This project is a collaborative research initiative designed to explore political comparisons between populations with unequal, minimal or non-existent state protections and national governments. As of late, Professor Hanchard has been continuing his commendable work by serving as the Gustav C. Kuemmerle Professor of Africana Studies at the University of Pennsylvania. BLACK INDIVIDUALS AND COMMUNITIES + EDUCATION

Many people still think that racism is no longer a problem in US, after the election of President Obama. However, over six decades after the Supreme Court declared "separate but equal" schools to be unconstitutional in *Brown v. Board of Education*, schools remain heavily segregated by race and ethnicity.

Legal segregation had ended, but true equality had not been achieved. Even today, due to the race, many communities tend to separate themselves into different neighborhoods, consequently, the schools are often heavily dominated by one racial group or another, causing school segregation.

In the past 12 months, 55 percent of people with some college experience reported people had acted suspicious of them, compared to 38 percent of those with no college experience. Moreover, 52 percent of these students, reported people had acted as if they thought the individual wasn't smart.

Likewise, Black college students report higher levels of stress related to racial discrimination compared to other racial or ethnic groups. The unfortunate reality is that Black Americans experience subtle and overt discrimination from preschool all the way to college.

STATISTICS

The results of a [recent survey by the Pew Research Center](#) underscore this point. The survey results revealed several differences between Black individuals with college experience versus Black individuals without college experience. For example, Black Americans with some college experience are more likely to say that they have experienced discrimination compared to Black individuals who did not report having any college experience.

CONSEQUENCES

*It depresses education outcomes for Black students; as shown in this report, it lowers their standardized test scores.

*It widens performance gaps between white and Black students.

*It reflects and bolsters segregation by economic status, with Black students being more likely than white students to attend high-poverty schools.

YOUR FEAR

I go on a walk—
I'm squinting, sun's too bright,
But it feels nice,
Feels like a hug,
Feels like warmth,
Feels like
Today is a good day.
As I pass house after house a flash
and a beep:
Red truck, silver sedan, cars keep
Suddenly locking.
I'm at a party;
I'm the only black snowflake in this
sea of pale snow,
In this sea of white air force ones
Left creased and unnurtured,
Of pastel polos,
Of light washed jeans and
Fancy logos
That I can't afford.
The cops get called for a noise
complaint.
They come in before we scatter;
Not my house, I am sober, guess it
doesn't matter;
They only question me that night,
Nobody else.
I'm leaving Walmart when stopped
by an employee
Who asks for my receipt:
Proof of my purchase of school
supplies;
He claims a "new policy"
Angry, but I show him my receipt,
My freedom papers Signed by their
machine,
Today, my benevolent master,
Today, my proof of innocence.
Three white customers beside us
leave
Uninterrupted;
My peace interrupted
Again and again.
The message is clear.
You scream to me over and over in
your whispers
And through your quiet deeds:

That I am a threat,
That I am suspicious,
That I am dangerous
Because of my blackness.

Hold on, **you** fear **me**?
Fuck do you mean?
You the violent one,
You the thief,
You the murderer,
You the barbarian,

Yet what is my reality?
That I am a threat because of my
blackness,
When the true reality
Is that your fear of me
Is a constant threat to my life,
A gun trailing me
Everywhere I go.
My cross, my weight to bear,
Your fear.
And living with the burden of your
fear
Is a heavy, heavy burden.

This myth of fear was intentionally
crafted,
Reinforced, manufactured, drafted,
The key element in the molding of
the metals
Of our chains For our enslavement,
The metals
Of the silver watches on your wrists
and glasses on the eyes of your
children watching
As you lynched us,
The metals
Of your cash registers and your
safes and your guns,
Guardians of your profit.

What a cheap disguise,
What a thin veil,

A violent lie bought by too many;
A lie built deeply into the American
conscience,
A country, a poisoned tree, of false
realities.
Your fear is all a front.
It is a weapon;
Just ask Amy, ask Derek,
Ask the Beckys and the Karens, Ask
Donald, ask too many cops,
Ask yourself.
Because when we look deeper
We see the truth;
We see that at the root
Of this poisoned tree,
With poisoned branches
And poisoned leaves,
With forbidden fruit,
Of lies, of sin, of fright,
At the root
Of this magnificent tree,
Of this handsome tree,
Of this ugly tree
It is not so much fear
As an excruciating discomfort;
Outrage that we
Beautiful black beings
Have the audacity

Beyond the reach of your poisoned
tree
And its poisoned seeds
And your metal watches and glasses
And cash registers and chains.
